Still there's light at the end of the tunnel in some places; seems Broadway plans to open around September with *WICKED, HAMILTON* and *COMPANY* as some of the first back on the boards. Let's hope there's not another variant in the wind...

As you know, when we have two or more companies staging the same show in a particular year, we send the same judges to each production - we are presently waiting to see what will happen to Spotlight Theatre's PRISCILLA which opened a week before the current lockdown. Hopefully nothing will get in the way of the same show at Ballina and Toowoomba. Similarly, A MIDSUMMER NIGHT'S DREAM had to be cancelled during its performance by Technicolour Theatre Company on the GC; we were able to get judges to a replacement show quickly - they will also attend at Trinity College, Lismore. Unfortunately Shepherd's Purse Theatre Company at Tyalgum have had to defer their season. Such is life for thespians at the moment!

Keep smiling - keep singing - keep dancing! Remember, the show must go on, Covid Virus notwithstanding!! It may be of interest to you all to know that even in this difficult year, our judges have attended 53 shows in 2021 - with more to emerge as the situation loosens up!



## **JUDGES THOUGHTS**

King Lear on the Gold Coast in 2021! The Storm Within.



Opening on August 5th will be Mercury's Wings Theatre Company production of Shakespeare's King Lear. This remarkable play will be presented in a rather special place, not used as a theatre performance space before. This will be the spectacular Occulus Fountain at the Smith Collective at Southport. The Smith Collective, once the site of the 2018 Commonwealth Games Athletes Village, is now a modern, urban village adjacent to the university and hospital. The Occulus Fountain is at the centre of it and provides a spectacular performance space for the company

and this production.

Amongst a collection of astonishing plays written by William Shakespeare, King Lear is surely one of the writers most extraordinary. Its themes of age, of generational change, of parents and their children, of the challenge to preserve oneself when circumstances change completely around one, of dealing with the imponderable realities of cause and effect, of the human challenge of dealing with the unintended and uncomfortable consequences of our actions. Shakespeare's plays and their productions continue to find a connection with the key events or concerns of the times in which they are performed. One very pertinent one is the journey to retirement and the wish to lighten one's burden without relinquishing the honour or the privileges that bearing it has won.

As we traverse our own difficult times, research tells us that we are not so far from London, July 1606, when a very different plague ravished the community and closed the theatres. Volpone, The Revenger's Tragedy and King Lear were among the plays you could hear echoing through the South Bank. The streets were deserted, shops closed, carers carrying three-foot staffs painted red, so everyone kept their distance, and church bells tolling endlessly for funerals. The script is saturated with words and images of death chaos, nihilism, and desperation. A time not too different today as we as a community, a country and a world confront the everchanging challenges with which Covid 19 confronts us.

Mercury Wings Theatre Company, under the leadership of Claudine Anderson and James Anderson, has been producing substantial theatre on the Gold Coast for over 15 years. Recently bringing productions of Waiting For Godot, Shakespeare's The Tempest and Thursdays Child to stages around the Gold Coast. The company has focused on both Australian and International, contemporary and classical works that provide a diverse and challenging experience for local audiences and performers. This year the company presents what some would argue is the greatest play ever written. I certainly would.

For me, this play speaks to the continuing value that Shakespeare holds for us and our communities. He probably could not have foreseen how often his plays continue to be performed and the great deal they offer us to ponder. Please join us for this theatrical adventure with a great play and an exceptional venue.

Yes, but they do much more. The music drives the energy of the production with the rhythm, develops much of the dynamic variation, creates various moods and emotions and shapes the climax of the show. After their own individual practice, these musicians work with the

conductor for hours of "team" rehearsal to produce a well-balanced blend of harmonious sound that supports the entire production.

Their acknowledgement – names on the program and a hand-wave from the stage! Surely they deserve at least a team photo in the program to acknowledge not only their essential part of the performance, but also their artistic value. Without them, there would be no musical!
